Chheang Vannarith (Chapter 1) is President of Asian Vision Institute (AVI). He has over a decade of work experience as a geopolitical and geo-economic analyst, with a focus on Southeast Asia. He was honoured a Young Global Leader by the World Economic Forum in 2013. He was the Executive Director of the Cambodian Institute for Cooperation and Peace (CICP) from 2009 to 2013. He received his MA in International Relations from the International University of Japan in 2006, Graduate in Leadership from the East West Center in 2008, and PhD in Asia Pacific Studies from the Ritsumeikan Asia Pacific University in 2009.

Heng Pheakdey (Chapter 1) is Strategic Advisor to Asian Vision Institute (AVI), Founder and Chairman of Enrich Institute, a Phnom Penh based SDGs think tank. Dr. Heng has more than 10 years of public policy experience leading policy research, training, planning and development for various local national and international organizations including: UNDP, UNESCAP, World Bank, GGGI, PFAN, Konrad Adenauer Stiftung, Asia Competitiveness Institute, Asia Foundation, GERES, NGO-Forum, just to name a few. Dr. Heng obtained his master degree from Lee Kuan Yew School of Public Policy in Singapore and his Ph.D from VU University Amsterdam in the Netherlands.

Ngeow Chow-Bing (Chapter 2) is Director of the Institute of China Studies at the University of Malaya. In addition, he has also been appointed a Special Senior Research Fellow at the National Institute for Global Strategy, Chinese Academy of Social Sciences (2017-2020), and served as a delegate of the Southeast Asian Young Leaders Programme (SEAYLP) at the Institute of International and Strategic Studies' 17th Shangri-La Dialogue in 2018.

Dr. Ngeow received his PhD in Public and International Affairs from Northeastern University. His scholarly articles on China have appeared in peer-reviewed journals such as *China Review*, *Ethnic and Racial Studies*, *Journal of Contemporary China*, *Contemporary Southeast Asia*, *East Asia: An International Quarterly*, *China: An International Journal*, *Problems of Post-Communism*, *Issues and Studies*, and *International Journal of China Studies*. He has published three coedited books: *Zhenghe Forum: Connecting China with the Muslim World* (2016); *Southeast Asia and China: Exercises in Mutual Socialization* (2017); and *Rising China, Resilient Japan, Resourceful ASEAN: Selected Writings of Lee Poh Ping on East Asian International Relations* (2018). His latest edited book, *Researching China in*

Southeast Asia, will be published in the middle of 2019.

He has been interviewed by local media such as *Sinchew Daily*, *Oriental Daily News*, *The Star*, *Free Malaysia Today*, *The Edge*, *Malaysiakini*, and international media including *South China Morning Post*, *Forbes*, *The Straits Times*, *Xinhua News Agency*, *China Business Times*, and *Duowei News* for issues pertaining to China and Malaysia-China relations. He has also contributed opinion pieces to online policy magazines such as *East Asia Forum*, *IAPS Dialogue*, and *CPI Analysis*.

Dr. Ngeow’s research interests include China’s political reforms, organization and management of the Chinese Communist Party, China’s minorities, and China-Southeast Asia relations.

Alan Chong (Chapter 3) is Associate Professor and Acting Head, Centre for Multilateralism Studies, at the S. Rajaratnam School of International Studies (RSIS), located within the Nanyang Technological University in Singapore. He has published widely on the notion of soft power and the role of ideas in constructing the international relations of Singapore and Asia. These ideational angles have also led to inquiry into some aspects of ‘non-traditional security’ issues in Asia. His publications have appeared in *The Pacific Review*; *International Relations of the Asia-Pacific*; *Journal of Southeast Asian Studies*; *Asian Survey*; *Contemporary Southeast Asia*; *East Asia: An International Quarterly*; *Politics, Religion and Ideology*; the *Review of International Studies*; the *Cambridge Review of International Affairs*; *Armed Forces and Society*, the *Journal of Strategic Studies*; *Global Change, Peace and Security*; and in the *Japanese Journal of Political Science*. He is also the author of *Foreign Policy in Global Information Space: Actualizing Soft Power* (Palgrave, 2007), editor of *International Security in the Asia-Pacific: Transcending ASEAN towards Transitional Polycentrism* (Palgrave, 2018) and co-editor (with Faizal bin Yahya) of *State, Society and Information Technology in Asia* (Ashgate/Routledge, 2014). He is currently working on several projects exploring the notion of ‘Asian international theory’. His interest in soft power has also led to inquiry into the sociological and philosophical foundations of international communication. In tandem, he has pursued a fledgling interest in researching cyber security issues and international discursive conflicts. Professor Chong has occasionally served as the principal external examiner of the Bachelor of Security Studies and Management programme at the Singapore University of the Social Sciences and had served briefly as Singapore’s National Focal Point for the subject of the ‘Right to Peace’ under the

ambit of the ASEAN Intergovernmental Commission on Human Rights. He has also frequently been interviewed in the Asian media, briefly taught at Singapore's Goh Keng Swee Command and Staff College, and consulted in think-tank networks in the region.
