**Dr. Zhu Feng** began his college studies at the Department of International Politics of Peking University in 1981 and received his Ph.D. from Peking University in 1991. He is currently a Professor at the university's School of International Studies and is Deputy Director of the Center for International and Strategic Studies (CISS) of Peking University. He writes extensively on regional security in East Asia, nuclear North Korea issue, American national security strategy, China-U.S. relations and missile defense. He is a leading Chinese security expert and senior research fellow of the Center for Peace and Development of China. Dr. Zhu Feng sits on editorial boards of several scholarly journals, consults independently for the Chinese government and private sector, and comments frequently on television, radio, and print media on China foreign affairs and security policy. His recent books are *Ballistic Missile Defense and International Security* (Shanghai: Shanghai People's Press, 2001), *International Relations Theory and East Asian Security* (Beijing: People's University Press, 2007), and *China's Rise: From Theoretical and Practical Perspectives* (co-edited with Prof. Robert S. Ross, Cornell University Press, forthcoming).

**Dr. Chung-In Moon** is a Professor of international relations at the Yonsei University and an Adjunct Professor at the Asia-Pacific Studies Institute of the Duke University. He is also Associate Coordinator of the World International Studies Committee and Selection Committee Member of the Global Security Cooperation Program, Social Science Research Council (USA). In 2003, he was a visiting fellow of the Japan-Korea Cultural Exchange Fund. He has a doctorate and a master's in political science from the University of Maryland in 1984 and 1981, respectively, and a bachelor's in philosophy from Yonsei University in 1977. He authored *Arms Control on the Korean Peninsula* (Yonsei University Press, 1996) and co-authored *Economic Crisis and Structural Reforms in South Korea: Assessments and Implications* (Washington, D.C.: Economic Strategic Institute, 2000). In addition, he has published over 100 articles and chapters in major political scientific journals and books.

**Dr. Andrei N. Lankov** is an Associate Professor of the College of Social Studies, at Kookmin University in Seoul and a senior lecturer of faculty of Asian studies at the Australian National University. His main research interests are North Korean

political and social history, Soviet and Chinese policy toward the Korean Peninsula, and modernization in Korea. He graduated from Leningrad State University and earned a Ph.D. in history. He started his academic career as an Assistant Professor at Leningrad (St. Petersburg) State University from 1989. He has experience teaching at Chung-Ang University and Osan College in Republic of Korea. He wrote more than 40 articles and eight books including *1956: The Challenge to Kim Il Sung and the Failure of de-Stalinization in the DPRK* (Honolulu: Hawaii University Press, 2005). He has attended many international conferences, wrote a large number of newspaper articles in Russian and English and also has been interviewed by CNN, Reuters and the BBC about Korean Peninsula problems.

**Professor Victor D. Cha** (Ph.D. Columbia, MA Oxford, BA Columbia) left the White House in May 2007 after serving since 2004 as Director for Asian Affairs at the National Security Council. At the White House, he was responsible primarily for Japan, the Korean Peninsula, Australia/New Zealand and Pacific Island nation affairs. Dr. Cha was also the Deputy Head of Delegation for the United States at the Six-Party Talks in Beijing. He returns to Georgetown where he holds the D. S. Song-Korea Foundation Chair in Asian Studies in the Department of Government and the Edmund Walsh School of Foreign Service. He is the award-winning author of *Alignment Despite Antagonism: The United States-Korea-Japan Security Triangle* (Stanford University Press) (winner of the 2000 Ohira Book Prize) and co-author of *Nuclear North Korea: A Debate on Engagement Strategies* (Columbia University Press, 2004). He has written articles on international relations and East Asia in journals including *Foreign Affairs*, *International Security*, *Political Science Quarterly*, *Survival*, *International Studies Quarterly*, and *Asian Survey*. Professor Cha is a former John M. Olin National Security Fellow at Harvard University, two-time Fulbright Scholar, and Hoover National Fellow and CISAC Fellow at Stanford University. He serves as an independent consultant, and has testified before Congress on Asian security issues. He has been a guest analyst for various media including CNN, ABC Nightline, CBS Morning Show, Fox News, MSNBC, CNBC, BBC, and National Public Radio. Until 2004, he directed the American Alliances in Asia project at Georgetown. He is currently writing a book on Sports Diplomacy in Asia and the Beijing Olympics. From 2007 he will be Director of the Asian Studies Program at Georgetown.

**Ambassador Charles L. (Jack) Pritchard** is the President of the Korea Economic Institute (KEI) in Washington, DC. Prior to joining KEI, he was a visiting fellow at the Brookings Institution in Washington, DC from September 2003 until February 2006. He is the author of *Failed Diplomacy: The Tragic Story of How North Korea Got the Bomb*, Brookings Press, June 2007. Ambassador Pritchard served as ambassador and special envoy for negotiations with the Democratic People's Republic of Korea and United States representative to the Korean Peninsula Energy Development Organization in the administration of President George W. Bush from April 2001 until September 2003. Previously, he served as Special Assistant to the President for National Security Affairs and Senior Director for Asian Affairs in the administration of President William J. Clinton. During the Clinton administration, Ambassador Pritchard was also the Director of Asian Affairs in the National Security Council and deputy chief negotiator for the Four Party Peace Talks, which aimed at reducing the tensions on the Korean Peninsula. He also accompanied Secretary of State Madeleine Albright to North Korea for meetings with North Korean leader Kim Jong Il. Pritchard obtained his B.A. in Political Science from Mercer University in Georgia and his M.A. in International Studies from the University of Hawaii. He is the recipient of the Defense Distinguished Service Medal. He is also a graduate of the National Institute for Defense Studies, Class 40.

**Dr. Yong-Sup Han** is a Professor at Korea National Defense University, and Director of the Research Institute on National Security Affairs since January 2005. He was Special Assistant to the Korean Minister of Defense in 1993 and a Senior Staff Member to the South-North Joint Nuclear Control Commission in 1991-92. Dr. Han holds a master's degree in Political Science from Seoul National University and a Masters in Public Policy from Harvard University, and a Ph.D. on Security Policy from RAND Graduate School of the RAND Corporation in the United States. His publications include: "Analyzing the South Korea's Defense Reform" (*Korean Journal of Defense Analysis*, Spring 2006), "The Six Party Talks and Security Cooperation in Northeast Asia," in *North Korea's Second Nuclear Crisis and Northeast Asian Security* edited by Seung-Ho Joo and Tae-Hwan Kwak (Ashgate, 2007), *Peace and Arms Control on the Korean Peninsula* (Kyungnam University Press, 2005), *Sunshine in Korea* (RAND, 2002), "Time for Conventional Arms Control on the Korean Peninsula" (*Arms Control Today*, December 2000), "North Korean Behavior in Nuclear Negotiations" (*The Nonproliferation Review*, Spring 2000), *Nuclear Disarmament and Nonproliferation*

*in Northeast Asia* (the United Nations, 1995), etc.

**Hideshi Takesada** was born in Kobe and graduated from Keio University and finished Graduate School at Keio University, Tokyo in 1974. After entering the National Defense College in 1975, he has been working for 32 years at the National Institute for Defense Studies (NIDS, renamed), and Executive Director since 2007. Prof. Takesada also graduated from the Korean language course of Yonsei University, Seoul, was a visiting scholar at Stanford University and George Washington University, and Visiting Professor (1992-93) at Chung-Ang University, Seoul. Prof. Takesada received the First Best Article Prize of the National Defense Society (Tokyo), and has published extensively on Korean security issues, including many books such as *Terrible Strategist Kim Jounge-il* (Tokyo: PHP Institute, 2001); *Deep Analysis on North Korea* (KK Best Sellers, 1998); Co-author of *Analysis on Process of Japan's Foreign Policy Decision Making* (PHP Institute, 1999); *International Politics in the Cold War Era* (Keio University Press, 1987); and *Restructuring Global Security and Crisis Management* (COE-INES Booklet Series 1, 2006). He has also contributed many articles to the *Journal of National Defense* (Tokyo), *Revue Diplomatic* (Tokyo) and *The Korean Journal of Defense Analysis* (Seoul).
