**Dr. Sang-Woo Rhee** is the President and CEO of New Asia Research Institute, Inc. (NARI), which Dr. Rhee founded in 1993. NARI aims to analyze changing relations in the Asia-Pacific region and thereby help to establish a peaceful order in Asia, which in turn will ensure the survival and prosperity of the Republic of Korea. At present Dr. Rhee serves as chairman of the Presidential Military Reform Commission. Dr. Rhee has also been the chairman of the Korea-Japan Cultural Foundation since 1994. Since 2009, he has served as a member of the Advisory Commission for Unification at the Blue House, and as a board member of the Sejong Institute. He was a Professor of Political Science at Sogang University, and President of Hallym University and the Hallym Institute of Advanced International Studies. Dr. Rhee has served as President of the Korean Association of International Studies, Chairman of the Policy Advisory Committee of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs, President of the Korean Association of Communist Studies, and Chairman of the Presidential Commission on the 21st Century. He received his Ph.D. in Political Science from the University of Hawaii. He has authored 15 professional books including *The Security Environment of Korea*, *Security and Unification of Korea*, *North Korean Politics*, *Theories of International Relations*, and *International Politics*.

**Dr. Larry Nicksch** is a Senior Associate at the Center for Strategic and International Studies, and retired from the Congressional Research Service in February 2010 after more than 43 years as a Specialist in Asian Affairs. He earlier served an additional three years at the U.S. Department of Commerce. At the CRS, Dr. Nicksch provided information and conducted research for Members of Congress and congressional committees on security and political issues related to U.S. relations with the countries of East Asia and the Western Pacific. During that time, he authored many private papers and articles on these issues and participated in numerous conferences in the United States, East Asia, and Europe. He is also the Senior Adviser for East Asia with the PRS (Political Risk Service) Group. Dr. Nicksch received his Master of Science in Foreign Service degree from Georgetown University, and a doctoral degree from Georgetown University.

**Professor Hideshi Takesada** is a former Executive Director of the NIDS and

Professor of Underwood International College at Yonsei University, Seoul. He completed Graduate School at Keio University, Tokyo. Since entering the National Defense College, he has been working for 32 years at the NIDS, and has been its Executive Director since 2007. Prof. Takesada also graduated from the Korean language course at Yonsei University, Seoul, was a visiting scholar at Stanford University and George Washington University, and Visiting Professor at Chung-Ang University, Seoul. Prof. Takesada received the First Best Article Prize of the National Defense Society (Tokyo), and has published extensively on Korean security issues, including many books, such as: *Terrible Strategist Kim Jong-il* (Tokyo: PHP Institute, 2001); *Deep Analysis on North Korea* (KK Best Sellers, 1998); *Analysis of the Process of Japan's Foreign Policy Decision Making* (co-author; PHP Institute, 1999); *International Politics in the Cold War Era* (Keio University Press, 1987); and *Restructuring Global Security and Crisis Management* (COE-INES Booklet Series 1, 2006). He has also contributed many articles to the *Journal of National Defense* (Tokyo), *Revue Diplomatique* (Tokyo), and *The Korean Journal of Defense Analysis* (Seoul).

**Professor Scott Snyder** is Director of the Center for U.S.-Korea Policy at The Asia Foundation and a Senior Associate at Pacific Forum CSIS. He is also the Adjunct Senior Fellow for Korean Studies at the Council on Foreign Relations and is based in Washington, DC. He lived in Seoul, South Korea as Korea Representative of The Asia Foundation during 2000-2004. Previously, he served as a Program Officer in the Research and Studies Program of the U.S. Institute of Peace, and as Acting Director of The Asia Society's Contemporary Affairs Program. His latest book, *China's Rise and the Two Koreas: Politics, Economics, Security*, was published by Lynne Rienner in 2009. His publications include *Paved With Good Intentions: The NGO Experience in North Korea* (2003), co-edited with L. Gordon Flake, and *Negotiating on the Edge: North Korean Negotiating Behavior* (1999). Snyder received his B.A. from Rice University and an M.A. from the Regional Studies – East Asia Program at Harvard University. He was the recipient of a Pantech Visiting Fellowship at Stanford University's Shorenstein Asia-Pacific Research Center during 2005-2006, received an Abe Fellowship, administered by the Social Sciences Research Council, in 1998-99, and was a Thomas G. Watson Fellow at Yonsei University in South Korea in 1987-88.

**Dr. Dingli Shen** is Professor of international relations at Fudan University, Shanghai. He is the Executive Dean of Fudan University's Institute of International Studies, and Director of its Center for American Studies. He co-founded and directs China's first non-government-based Program on Arms Control and Regional Studies, at Fudan University. Dr. Shen teaches international security, China-U.S. relations, and China's foreign policy, in China, the U.S., and the "Semester at Sea" program. His research and publications cover China-U.S. security relations, regional security and international strategy, arms control and nonproliferation, foreign and defense policy of China and the U.S., and so on. He received his Ph.D. in physics from Fudan in 1989 and did his post-doctoral work in arms control at Princeton University. He was an Eisenhower Fellow, and in 2002 advised the then U.N. Secretary General Kofi Annan regarding strategic planning for his second term. He is on the Global Council of the Asia Society, and was appointed by Shanghai Municipality as Shanghai's Conference Ambassador. Dr. Shen has co-edited 18 books, and published 1,300 articles and papers worldwide, including the recent works "Can Sanctions Stop Proliferation" (*Washington Quarterly*, 2008), "Cooperative Denuclearization toward North Korea" (*Washington Quarterly*, 2009), and so on.

**Dr. Andrei Lankov** is Professor at Kookmin University in Seoul. He was born in Leningrad (now Petersburg) and completed his undergraduate and graduate studies at Leningrad State University; during that time, he went to Pyongyang's Kim Il-sung University in 1984-85. In 1996 he moved to Australia to take up a position at the Australian National University, and moved back to Seoul to teach at Kookmin University in 2004. His major research interest is the political and social history of North Korea. Recently his focus has largely been on the transformation of North Korean society following the death of Kim Il Sung and the dramatic growth of markets. His major English language publications on North Korea include the books *From Stalin to Kim Il Sung: The Formation of North Korea, 1945-1960* (Rutgers University Press, 2003) and *Crisis in North Korea: The Failure of De-Stalinization, 1956* (University of Hawaii Press, 2004). He has also published in *Foreign Affairs*, *Foreign Policy*, and other major journals, as well as authoring a number of newspaper columns.

**Dr. Takashi Kawakami** is Professor at the Graduate School of Takushoku

University specializing in security issues and the U.S.-Japan relationship. After receiving his doctorate from the Osaka School of International Public Policy at Osaka University, he served as a senior research fellow at the National Institute for Defense Studies. He is the author of *Beikokuno tai-Nichi seisaku* (America's Japan Strategy), *U.S. Forward Deployment and the U.S.-Japan Alliance*, *The Collapse and Realignment of the International System*, *The Power Brokers*, and so on.

**Dr. Chung Min Lee** is Dean of the Underwood International College (UIC) and the Dean of the Graduate School of International Studies (GSIS) at Yonsei University. In January 2010, Dr. Lee was appointed by President Lee Myung-bak as Ambassador for International Security Affairs and Global Issues. Since April 2009, Dr. Lee has been a Senior Fellow for Asian Security at the International Institute for Strategic Studies (IISS), the world's premier security studies think tank. Dr. Lee has also held a number of administrative posts at Yonsei University, including Director of International Education and Exchange and Vice Dean of External Affairs. In 2008, Dr. Lee was appointed as a member of the President's Foreign Policy Advisory Council and to the Presidential Council on Future and Vision. He also serves as an advisor to various government ministries and agencies including the Office of the Prime Minister, Ministry of National Defense, Ministry of Unification, the Foreign Affairs Committee of the National Assembly, and others. Dr. Lee was a visiting research fellow at the NIDS, Tokyo. Dr. Lee received his Ph.D. from the Fletcher School of Law and Diplomacy, Tufts University. He has written extensively on various aspects of Asian security including strategic developments on the Korean Peninsula and security challenges in East Asia. His research interests include assessing key trends in international and Asian security affairs, WMD proliferation, crisis management, national security policy planning, defense technologies, and intelligence.
