Joel S. WIT, concurrently Senior Fellow at the U.S.-Korea Institute at SAIS and Adjunct Senior Fellow at Columbia University's Weatherhead Institute for East Asia, is the founder of "38 North" (www.38north.org) and the project lead. An internationally recognized expert on Northeast Asian security issues and non-proliferation, Mr. Wit has 20 years of experience in the U.S. State Department and the Washington think-tank arena. After a short stint on detail to the Central Intelligence Agency writing the first National Intelligence Estimate on ballistic missile proliferation, Mr. Wit was a member of U.S. delegations to the Strategic Arms Limitation and Intermediate Nuclear Force Talks with the Soviet Union.

In 1993, he joined the staff of Ambassador Robert L. Gallucci and was an important player in reaching the 1994 U.S.-North Korea Agreed Framework. From 1995-2000, Mr. Wit was the State Department Coordinator for implementation of that agreement, playing a key role in the formation of KEDO and its operations as well as working with North Korea on other aspects of the Agreed Framework.

Mr. Wit has been an International Affairs Fellow at the Council on Foreign Relations, a Senior Associate at the Henry L. Stimson Center, a Guest Scholar at the Brookings Institution and a Senior Fellow at the Center for Strategic and International Studies. He is the founder of the38North website and has written numerous articles on North Korea and non-proliferation. Mr. Wit is also the co-author of the book *Going Critical: The First North Korean Nuclear Crisis.*

Hyeong-wook BOO is a research fellow at Korea Institute for Defense Analyses (KIDA). He is serving as Chief of Defense Strategy Research Division for KIDA and holding adjunct professor position at Korea National Defense University. He graduated Seoul National University (SNU) and got master's degree at SNU. At Virginia Tech, he majored crisis management and got Ph.D. degree in public affairs. He published several articles regarding cyber security; Issues of Cyber Security and Policy Directions: Discussions for the Establishment of Defense Ministry's Cyber Policy (Journal of National Defense Studies, Vol. 56, No. 2. June 2013). The Evolution of North Korean Military Threats and Crisis Management (Weekly Defense Review, No. 1465, 2013). Cyber War and Policy Suggestions for South Korean Planners (International Journal of Korean Unification Studies, Vol. 21, No. 2, 2012). He presented several cyber security related papers in various international conferences with Indonesia, India, and the US.

In 2015, he attended a ten days cyber security workshop hosted by a French security research institute, IHEDN (Institut des hautes études de défense nationale).

Hideya KURATA is a Professor at Department of International Relations, National Defense Academy; an Adjunct Fellow, Japan Institute of International Affairs (JIIA). His majors are International Security, Korean Politics and Foreign Policies. He learned at Graduate School of Keio University in Tokyo and Yonsei University in Seoul. Before joining the NDA in 2008, he served Research Fellow at JIIA and Associate Professor and Professor at Kyorin University (2001-2008). His publications include "A Conceptual Analysis of the Six-Party Talks: Building Peace through Security Assurances" *Asian Security*, Vol.3, No.1 (2007, in English), "Six-Party Talks and the Establishment of the Peace System at the Korean Peninsula," *North Korean Studies*. Vol. 1 (2005, in Korean). He also co-edited, *Korean Peninsula and International Politics*, Keio University Press, 2005 (in Japanese), etc,.

Bruce E. BECHTOL, Jr. (Ph.D. Union Institute), is an award winning professor of political science at Angelo State University and a retired Marine. He was formerly on the faculty at the Marine Corps Command and Staff College (2005-2010) and the Air Command and Staff College (2003-2005). Dr. Bechtol served as an adjunct visiting professor at the Korea University Graduate School of International Studies (2006–2007). He was an intelligence officer at the Defense Intelligence Agency from 1997 until 2003, eventually serving as the senior analyst for Northeast Asia in the Intelligence Directorate (J2) on the Joint Staff in the Pentagon. He formerly sat on the editorial review board of the East Asian Review from 2005 to 2009 and served as editor of the Defense Intelligence Journal from 2004 to 2005. He is currently on the editorial advisory board of the Korea Observer (2011-present), and is on the scientific board of Global Humanities (2014present). He is the current president of the International Council on Korean Studies, and serves on the board of directors of the Council on U.S.-Korean Security Studies. He is the author of North Korea and Regional Security in the Kim Jong-un Era: A New International Security Dilemma (Palgrave Macmillan: 2014), The Last Days of Kim Jong-II: The North Korean Threat in a Changing Era (University of Nebraska Press: 2013), Defiant Failed State: The North Korean Threat to International Security (Potomac Books: 2010), and Red Rogue: The Persistent Challenge of North Korea (Potomac Books: 2007), and he is the editor of Confronting Security Challenges on the Korean Peninsula (Marine Corps University Press: 2011) and The Quest for a Unified

Korea: Strategies for the Cultural and Interagency Process (Marine Corps University Foundation: 2007). He is also the author of more than thirty articles in peer-reviewed journals. A widely sought after expert on North Korean international security issues, Dr. Bechtol has been called on to present commentary to the BBC, CBC, FOX News, Radio New Zealand, syndicated nationwide radio shows such as POTUS politics on SIRIUS/XM, the John Batchelor show, the Frank Gaffney show, and several interviews on National Public Radio (to name a few). His latest (grant sponsored) project involves research about North Korea and proliferation to the Middle East and Africa.

Dongho JO is a professor of North Korean Studies at Ewha Womans University. Before joining the university in 2007, he had worked at Korea Development Institute for 16 years as senior fellow and director of North Korean Economic Studies. He was graduated from Seoul National University and received Ph.D. degree in economics from University of Pennsylvania in 1991. He has had lots of professional experiences. He is now a director of the Korea Eximbank Research Institute for North Korea and Northeast Asia Development, a standing member of the Advisory Council on Democratic and Peaceful Unification for the President of Korea, a member of Presidential Committee on Unification Preparation, chairman of Advisory Committee for Inter-Korean Economic Cooperation of Ministry of Unification, and a president of North Korea regularly for major newspapers and magazines and is now a columnist for Chosun Ilbo, the largest newspaper in Korea. His research areas are mainly the North Korean economy, inter-Korean cooperation, and economic cooperation in Northeast Asia.

Hiroyasu AKUTSU is a professor and senior fellow at the National Institute for Defense Studies (NIDS). He received his PhD in Political Science and International Relations at the Australian National University. Since joining NIDS in 2007, He has specialised in political and military affairs on the Korean Peninsula and also worked on security issues in Northeast Asia, alliance cooperation in the Asia-Pacific, strategic operations research, and so on. He also conducted research as a visiting fellow at the New Asia Research Institute in Seoul (1997-1998) and the Royal United Services Institute for Defense Studies in London (2010-2011) and a guest scholar at the Center for Strategic and International Studies in Washington DC (2014). Scott SNYDER is senior fellow for Korea studies and director of the program on U.S.-Korea policy at the Council on Foreign Relations (CFR), where he had served as an adjunct fellow from 2008 to 2011. Snyder's latest books include the co-authored volume The Japan-South Korea Identity Clash: East Asian Security and the United States (Columbia University Press, 2015) and Middle-Power Korea: Contributions to the Global Agenda (Council on Foreign Relations, June 2015) Snyder is also the co-editor of North Korea in Transition: Politics, Economy, and Society (Rowman and Littlefield, October 2012), and the editor of Global Korea: South Korea's Contributions to International Security (Council on Foreign Relations, October 2012). He served as the project director for CFR's Independent Task Force on policy toward the Korean Peninsula. He currently writes for the blog, "Asia Unbound ">http://blogs.cfr.org/asia/>." Prior to joining CFR, Snyder was a senior associate in the international relations program of The Asia Foundation, where he founded and directed the Center for U.S.-Korea Policy and served as The Asia Foundation's representative in Korea (2000-2004). He was also a senior associate at Pacific Forum CSIS. Mr. Snyder has worked as an Asia specialist in the research and studies program of the U.S. Institute of Peace and as acting director of Asia Society's contemporary affairs program. He was a Pantech visiting fellow at Stanford University's Shorenstein Asia-Pacific Research Center during 2005-06, and received an Abe fellowship, administered by the Social Sciences Research Council, in 1998-99. Snyder received a BA from Rice University and an MA from the regional studies East Asia program at Harvard University and was a Thomas G. Watson fellow at Yonsei University in South Korea.

Kang CHOI is the vice president for research and director of the Center for Foreign Policy and National Security at the Asan Institute for Policy Studies. Prior to joining the Asan Institute, he was the dean of Planning and Assessment at the Korea National Diplomatic Academy (KNDA). Previously, he also worked at the Institute for Foreign Affairs and National Security (IFANS) as the president (2012) as well as professor and director-general for American Studies (2008–2012). During that time, he also led the Council for Security Cooperation in the Asia-Pacific (CSCAP) Korea as chairman (2010–2012). From 1992 to 1998, Dr. Choi worked at the Korea Institute for Defense Analyses (KIDA) as associate research fellow and director of International Arms Control Studies, and later returned to KIDA as the chief executive officer of the Task Force for Current Defense Issues (2002–2005). Between those two periods, he served in the National Security Council Secretariat as senior director for Policy Planning and Coordination (1998–2002). He holds several advisory board memberships including: Committee on Foreign Affairs, Trade, and Unification in the National Assembly; Ministry of National Defense; Ministry of Unification; Air Force Development Committee; and the National Unification Advisory Council. Dr. Choi was also a South Korean delegate to the Four-Party Talks. He received his B.A. from Kyunghee University, M.A. from the University of Wisconsin-Madison, and Ph.D. from Ohio State University. He is specialized in and writes extensively on arms control and non-proliferation, the ROK–U.S. alliance, North Korean military affairs, inter-Korean affairs, crisis/consequence management and multilateral security cooperation.
