Dr. Aries A. Arugay (Chapter 1) is Professor of Political Science and Associate Dean for Research, Extension, and Publications in the College of Social Sciences and Philosophy, University of the Philippines in Diliman. He is also Editor-in-Chief of *Asian Politics & Policy* published by Wiley on behalf of the Policy Studies Organization. He has conducted research on comparative democratization, electoral politics, civil-military relations, contentious politics, and international relations of the Asia-Pacific. He was a visiting fellow at the Institute of Security and International Studies (ISIS Thailand), *Universidad Mayor de San Simón* (Bolivia), the University of Sydney, the Jeju Peace Institute, and the National Institute for Defense Studies (Japan). In 2019, he was given the ASEAN@50 Fellowship by New Zealand's Minister of Foreign Affairs and Trade. In 2020, the National Academy for Science and Technology of the Philippines recognized him as an Outstanding Young Scientist (Political Science). He obtained his PhD in Political Science from Georgia State University as a Fulbright Fellow and his MA and BA (cum laude) in Political Science from the University of the Philippines in Diliman.

Dr. Le Hong Hiep (Chapter 2) is Fellow at the ISEAS – Yusof Ishak Institute, Singapore. At ISEAS, he works for the Vietnam Studies Program and the Regional Strategic and Political Studies Program. He is also an editor of the Institute's flagship journal *Contemporary Southeast Asia*. Hiep holds a BA from the Diplomatic Academy of Vietnam, and an MA in International Relations and a Master of Diplomacy from the Australian National University. In 2015, Hiep earned his Ph.D. in Political and International Studies from the University of New South Wales. Before joining ISEAS, Hiep worked at the Ministry of Foreign Affairs of Vietnam and taught at the Faculty of International Relations, College of Social Sciences and Humanities, Vietnam National University -HCMC. Hiep's scholarly work has been widely published, including two books: *Living next to the Giant: The Political Economy of Vietnam's Relations with China under Doi Moi* (2016) and *Vietnam's Foreign Policy under Doi Moi* (2018, co-editor with Anton Tsvetov).

Dr. Broto Wardoyo (Chapter 3) is a lecturer in the Department of International Relations at Universitas Indonesia. He has also delivered lectures at School of Strategic and Global Studies, Universitas Indonesia, and currently teaches at Intelligence Studies Program, Terrorism Studies Program, and European Studies

Program. Before securing the current position, Dr. Broto served for several institutions, including Department of International Relations, Prof. Dr. Moestopo University Jakarta; ASEAN Study Center, Universitas Indonesia; and the Center for International Relations Studies, Universitas Indonesia. Dr. Broto is a graduate of University of Indonesia where he learned international relations studies, and he was awarded MA and Ph. D in Asia Pacific Studies from National Chengchi University, Taipei in 2010 and 2018, respectively. His research fields include international relations, security studies, and Indonesian defense policy. Dr. Broto has written a dozen of academic articles and is a co-author of *Indonesia's Policy in the Middle East*, published by FISIP-UI Press, 2008.

Dr. Thitinan Pongsudhirak (Chapter 4) is the Director of the Institute of Security and International Studies (ISIS) and Professor of International Relations at the Faculty of Political Science, Chulalongkorn University. He has authored a wide range of articles, books, book chapters, and more than 800 op-eds in news outlets such as *The Bangkok Post*, *The Straits Times*, *Nikkei Asian Review*, *South China Morning Post*, *International New York Times*, *Project Syndicate*, *Financial Times*, and his comments and views are frequently quoted in international and local media. Thitinan has worked for The BBC World Service, The Economist Intelligence Unit (EIU), and Gerson Lehrman Group. He holds an MA from Johns Hopkins School of Advanced International Studies and a PhD from the London School of Economics, having held visiting positions at Johns Hopkins SAIS, Stanford University, Yangon University, Victoria University in New Zealand, and University of Tübingen in Germany. A member of several editorial boards of leading academic journals, Thitinan received an award for excellence in opinion writing from the Society of Publishers in Asia (SOPA) in 2015. In March 2018, he was appointed ASEAN@50 Fellow by New Zealand's Minister of Foreign Affairs and Trade. In May 2019, he was selected as Australia-ASEAN Fellow based at Sydney's Lowy Institute.
