CHEN Zhimin (Chapter 1) is Chair and Professor of the Department of International Politics, School of International Relations and Public Affairs, Fudan University, Shanghai. His main research interests include international relations theory, diplomacy, Chinese foreign policy and EU studies. He was a Visiting Fellow at Harvard University, Queen's University, the University of Durham, and Lund University. His latest publication is *Contemporary Diplomatic Studies* (Peking University Press, 2008). He received a PhD from Fudan University in 1998.

SU Hao (Chapter 2) is Deputy Director for the Center for International Security, Department of Diplomacy, China Foreign Affairs University (CFAU). He specializes in Chinese foreign policy, international relations in the Asia-Pacific and strategic affairs. In addition to being in charge of graduate courses in international relations and security, Dr. Su has conducted research on Chinese external policies.
